

STUDENTS:

- SSOM's internal medicine residency program ranked first in performance scores out of 500 internal medicine residency programs in the United States.
- In FY19, 836 students applied to the school; 207 were granted interviews. Seventy-one students matriculated, all of whom have South Dakota residency status or strong South Dakota roots. Students came from 65 different South Dakota high schools.
- ▶ 80 percent of graduates plan to practice in South Dakota after residency
- All medical students are required to take the national Step 1 and Step 2 boards. For the current senior class, 100% passed both step 1 and step 2 on their first attempt.
- The new family medicine residency program in Pierre is fully operational with two residents. Residents do their first year in Sioux Falls and their final two years in Pierre. Later this year, the next class will enter and there will be four residents in Pierre.

RESEARCH:

- Active research programs focus on neuroscience, virology and the molecular basis of disease. Research is increasingly interdisciplinary, with medical scientists working collaboratively across colleges and universities.
- In FY19, SSOM garnered \$16.1 million in external grants and contracts, \$13.8 million from federal funds.

FACULTY:

 Approximately 2,000 South Dakota physicians teach SSOM students.







FRONTIER AND RURAL MEDICINE PROGRAM (FARM):

- Eleven students train for nine months in a rural area. Applicants exceed slots.
- Sites include Milbank, Mobridge, Parkston,
 Pierre, Spearfish, Vermillion and Winner.
- 10 of the 25 FARM students (40%) of graduates have matched in family medicine (versus 9% nationally)
