Public Health Accreditation

- Public health accreditation is the measurement of performance against a set of nationally recognized, evidence-based and practice-focused standards within 12 domains.
- Goal is to improve and protect the health of the public by advancing the quality and performance of public health departments.
- 3 pre-requisite plans:
 - State Health Assessment (to be completed by April 2020)
 - Collaborative process to collect and analyze data to develop priorities, garner resources, and plan actions to improve the population's health
 - State Health Improvement Plan (to be completed by August 2020)
 - Lays out specific steps to achieve measurable improvement on key priorities (statewide)
 - Department Strategic Plan (updated January 2020)
 - Outlines the strategic issues, goals, and objectives of the department (department-specific)



State Health Assessment/State Health Improvement Plan

- Currently conducting statewide health assessment to understand the health issues that impact priority populations across the state
 - Worked with partners to identify 22 unique indicators of health/well-being across the life span
 - Indicators cover behavioral health, chronic disease, environmental health, infectious disease, injury, and maternal and child health
- Next steps for completion of state health assessment
 - Key informant interviews help understand why some populations are not achieving the same health outcomes as others
 - Community conversations help understand health issues impacting communities, what's working, what's not working, and what can be done to help
- Health assessment will serve as the foundation for the development of the Health Improvement Plan
 - Convene partners to review the health assessment and map out strategies for the public health system to address the health needs of the state

Suicide in South Dakota

- Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in SD, but is the 2nd leading cause among ages 15 to 34
- With 192 suicides, SD has the 6th highest suicide rate in United States in 2017 (crude rate)
 - SD = 22.0 per 100,000 population
 - US = 14.5 per 100,000 population
- There were 168 suicides in 2018 in SD
- ❖ 78% of suicides were male and 22% were female (2009 2018)
- The SD Native American suicide rate is 2.5 times higher than the SD White suicide rate for 2009-2018
- ❖ 16.1% of SD high school students considered suicide (2015, YRBS)
- 8.4% of SD high school students attempted suicide (2015, YRBS)




Suicide Prevention

- This summer, Governor Noem asked the DOH to lead an interagency workgroup to develop a statewide suicide prevention plan
 - Departments involved included Health, Social Services, Education, Tribal Relations, and Agriculture as well as the Great Plains Tribal Chairmen's Health Board
- Included review of prior work related to suicide prevention and review of national strategies
- Developed framework for the plan including guiding principles, goals, objectives and strategies
- Distributed the draft suicide prevention plan to stakeholders and the public in Fall
 - Received nearly 300 comments
- Plan revised based on input received
- Development of 2020 Priority Strategies




Drug Abuse in South Dakota

2020 DOH Legislation

SB 16 - An Act to make an appropriation to reimburse certain health care professionals who have complied with the requirements for certain health care recruitment assistance programs and to declare an emergency.

Appropriates \$635,235 to reimburse two physicians, two dentists, one nurse practitioner, and one physician assistant who have complied with the requirements of the Recruitment Assistance Program and \$233,958 to reimburse eligible health care professionals who have complied with the terms of the Rural Health Care Facility Recruitment Assistance Program.

HB 1014 - An Act to place certain substances on the controlled substances schedule and to declare an emergency.

Updates South Dakota's controlled substance statute to be consistent with federal DEA scheduling actions that have occurred since the last legislative session.



2020 Health-Related Legislation

- SB 50 Revises certain provisions regarding the practice of certified registered nurse anesthetists (SUPPORT)
- HB 1056 Authorizes electronic monitoring of residents in assisted living centers and national facilities. (WATCH)
- ❖ HB 1063 Revises certain provisions regarding the purchase, distribution, and sale of tobacco products to persons under the age of 21. (WATCH)
- * HB 1235 Revises provisions regarding immunization. (OPPOSE)



OPPOSE WEAKENING IMMUNIZATION LAWS!!!

- While states are moving to strengthen their immunization laws, HB 1235 is a major step backwards for public health. Vaccines prevent disease in the people who receive them and protect those with compromised immune systems who come into contact with unvaccinated individuals.
- In 2019, there were 1282 cases of measles confirmed in 31 states. This is the most cases in the US since 1992. The majority of these cases were unvaccinated. The 2014-15 measles outbreak in SD included 10 cases unvaccinated by personal choice.
- Due to an increasing number of outbreaks of vaccine-preventable diseases in the past few years, 4 states repealed philosophical exemptions (California, Maine, Vermont, and Washington) and 3 states repealed religious exemptions (California, Maine and New York). Five states allow only medical exemptions (California, Maine, Mississippi, Nebraska, and West Virginia).
- Vaccines are effective and safe. Ensuring children entering school are immunized is critical to their health and the health of all people in our state.



Coronavirus and Influenza

Coronavirus- now named COVID-19

- Latest case counts as of 2/14/20:
 - ❖ Worldwide: 48,010
 - **US:** 15
- Precautions to limit spread:
 - Funneling of travelers from China
 - Monitoring and quarantine measures

Influenza

- Latest case counts-SD- as of 2/8/20
 - ❖ Cases: 7552 (2724 Influenza A/4828 Influenza B)
 - Hospitalizations: 268
 - Deaths: 7



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
