2027, and establish a claims code to track telehealth recertification. Telehealth flexibilities for hospice are currently authorized through March 31, 2025.

Senate <u>(S. 575)</u> and House of Representative (<u>H.R. 1317</u>) led by Rep. David Joyce (R-OH) and Senator Jeff Merkley (D-OH) **re-introduced 2/13/25** *Improving Care and Access to Nurses (I CAN)* Removes federal barriers that prohibit nurses from practicing to the full scope of their education and training in hospice, HHC and SNF. The <u>legislation</u> would also allow NPs to certify the terminal illness for hospice admission, expand eligibility to certify and recertify a Medicare beneficiary for home health services to certified nurse-midwives, and remove the requirement that SNF care be provided under the supervision of a physician and authorize NPs to perform admitting examinations and all required patient assessments.

Require hospital to provide information on available hospice programs to certain individuals upon discharge under the Medicare program (H.R. 2437) Introduced 3/27/25 by Representative Erin Houchin (R-IN)

**Lowering Costs for Caregivers Act of 2025** (H.R. 138) Introduced 1/3/25 by Rep. Vern Buchanan (R-FL) and Mike Thompson (D-CA) aims to ease the financial burden on families by allowing certain expenses for parents to be considered medical expenses under the Internal Revenue Code. This legislation provides families with greater financial flexibility to afford in-home care services, potentially increasing demand for professional home care providers. By reducing financial barriers, more families may choose home care services over institutional care, allowing agencies to expand their client base and enhance service offerings. It includes:

- Expansion of Health Savings Accounts (HSAs): The bill amends section 223(d)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code to allow individuals to use HSA funds for medical expenses incurred by a parent of either the account holder or their spouse. This change would apply to amounts paid after December 31, 2024.
- Flexible Spending and Health Reimbursement Arrangements: The bill ensures that funds from flexible spending accounts (FSAs) and health reimbursement arrangements (HRAs) can be used to cover medical expenses for a parent without affecting the tax advantages of these accounts. This provision applies to expenses incurred after December 31, 2024.
- Expansion of Archer Medical Savings Accounts (MSAs): Similar to HSAs, the bill allows Archer MSA funds to be used for medical expenses of a parent of the account holder or their spouse, beginning after December 31, 2024.

**Expanding Access to Palliative Care Act** (S. 1845) introduced by Sens Rosen(D-NV), Barrasso(R-WY), Baldwin(D-WI), and Fischer(R-NE). proposes the creation of a demonstration project to support improved access to palliative care services through a community-based model. If passed, the bill would require the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Innovation (CMMI) to develop a Community-Based Palliative Care (CBPC) demonstration- interdisciplinary care to people with serious illness in their home and lead to improved quality and cost outcomes. **CONNECT for Healthcare Act** – (<u>H.R.4189</u>) Introduced by Sens Schatz (D-HI), Wicker (R-MS), Cardin (D-MD), **Thune (R-SD)**, Warner (D-VA), & Hyde-Smith (R-MS) on June 15. It would build on expanding coverage of telehealth services through Medicare and make permanent COVID-19 telehealth flexibilities including Permanently allowing for the use of telehealth in the certification of a beneficiary for hospice. **Palliative Care and Hospice Education and Training Act-PCHETA** (US <u>SB 2243</u>): Reintroduced by Senators Baldwin and Capito: The Palliative Care and Hospice Education and Training Act (PCHETA) requires HHS to provide support for Palliative Care and Hospice Education Centers. The centers must improve the training of health professionals in palliative care and establish traineeships for individuals preparing for advanced-education nursing degrees, social work degrees, or advance degrees in physician assistant studies in PC. HHS may provide support to medical schools, teaching hospitals, and graduate medical-education programs for training physicians who plan to teach palliative medicine. HHS must (1) provide Palliative Medicine and Hospice Academic Career Awards to individuals to promote their career development, (2) support entities that operate a Palliative Care and Hospice Education Center, (3) support individuals in specified fields who are pursuing an advanced degree in palliative care or related fields, and (4) award grants to nursing programs to train individuals in providing palliative care. The Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) must provide for a national education and awareness campaign to inform patients, families, and health professionals about the benefits of palliative care. The National Institutes of Health must expand national research programs in palliative care. Read NHPCO's press release here. Senator Rounds (R-SD) has signed on to co-sponsor.

## PQLC Lobby Day for PCHETA, July 22

The Patient Quality of Life Coalition (PQLC) will be hosting its annual fly-in day in Washington DC on Tuesday, July 22, in support of the <u>Palliative Care and Hospice</u> <u>Education and Training Act (PCHETA)</u>. Advocates from across the country are needed to underscore the essential care that we deliver to people living with serious illness and their caregivers, and that investment in our interdisciplinary workforce is more critically needed. South Dakota is a targeted state- (Sen. Rounds) Dr. Amanda Sedlacek will represent SD. Last year, Dr. Franny Arneson went.

**Improving Access to Transfusion Care for Hospice Patients Act** (US <u>SB2566</u>) A bill to require CMMI demonstration to test allowing blood transfusions to be paid separately from the Medicare Hospice all-inclusive per diem payment was reintroduced to the Senate Finance Committee by Senator Rosen (D-NV) Read more <u>here.</u>

**Provider Training in Palliative Care Act** (S.2117) Sens Rosen (D-Nev) and Murkowski (R-Alaska) reintroduced legislation designed to expand the palliative care workforce. IF enacted it would allow medical students in the National Health Service Corps' (NHSC) to defer clinical service requirements for up to one year to pursue additional training in palliative care. They would also provide primary care during their time of service with HHSC. Read more here.

Improving Access to Advance Care Planning Act (H.R.8840/S.4873) New Version will be introduced soon and be ready for committee mark-up when larger legislative vehicles become available. The bills, sponsored by Rep. Blumenauer (H.R. 8840) and Senator Warner (S. 4873), remove Medicare copays for all ACP counseling, authorize Licensed Clinical Social Workers to use the two ACP billing codes to pay for ACP, and provide for additional provider education on these codes.

**Preserving Telehealth, Hospital and Ambulance Access Act**: Passed out of the House Ways and Means Committee by a vote of 41-0 read Leading Age summary <u>here</u>. Read <u>here</u> to see how this impacts hospices face to face specifically. Extends Hospital at Home waiver until 12/1/29 and telehealth extensions until 12-31-26
