This type of care is focused on providing relief from the symptoms and stress of illness with the goal of improving quality of life for both the patient and family. Effective palliative care is delivered by a trained team of doctors, nurses, social workers, chaplains, and other health professionals who collaborate to provide an extra layer of support wherever a person receives care. Based on the needs of the patient, not on prognosis, palliative care is appropriate at any age and any stage of serious illness.

	<b>SD Legislative Long Term Care Summer Study-</b> Monday January 29,2024 Senate House and Human Services committee heard testimony for SB 147- palliative care definition and education on the DoH website. The bill was carried by Sen. Hunhoff. Michele Snyders and Hillary Turner provided testimony in support of the bill and the following groups provided "me too" support: ACS-CAN; SDMA; SDNA; NASW-SD; AARP; South Dakota Heart Association, Presentation Sisters in Aberdeen, Sanford, and Avera. It <b>PASSED</b> unanimously in the Senate under consent so will next go straight to the house. The link to the bill and recording (click on the bird symbol) of the hearing <u>is here</u> . Luann shared that systems in Minneapolis using EPIC can track AD on patient portals and give annual reminders to relook at it. Nothing noted in SD patient portals by today's members on the call. Diane recommended as part of AD education to encourage younger completion of AD- specifically those who just turned 18. This will be shared with the task force!

	Hospice Education and Training Act (PCHETA) requires HHS to provide support
	for Palliative Care and Hospice Education Centers. The centers must improve the
	training of health professionals in palliative care and establish traineeships for
	individuals preparing for advanced-education nursing degrees, social work degrees,
	or advance degrees in physician assistant studies in PC. HHS may provide support
	to medical schools, teaching hospitals, and graduate medical-education programs
	for training physicians who plan to teach palliative medicine. HHS must (1)
	provide Palliative Medicine and Hospice Academic Career Awards to individuals
	to promote their career development, (2) support entities that operate a Palliative
	Care and Hospice Education Center, (3) support individuals in specified fields who
	are pursuing an advanced degree in palliative care or related fields, and (4) award
	grants to nursing programs to train individuals in providing palliative care. The

	<b>Provider Training in Palliative Care Act</b> (S.2117) Sens Rosen (D-Nev) and Murkowski (R-Alaska) reintroduced legislation designed to expand the palliative care workforce. IF enacted it would allow medical students in the National Health Service Corps' (NHSC) to defer clinical service requirements for up to one year to pursue additional training in palliative care. They would also provide primary care during their time of service with HHSC. Read more <u>here.</u>
State Grants	<b>R01 Grant-</b> JR LaPlant, Tinka Duran, Bethany-Rose Daubman, MD, Frannie Arneson, MD, Mary Isaacson; Dr. Daniel Peterite- 2020-July 31, 2024 Dr. Isaacson updated- grant is in the final stages. They have identified 3 cultural navigator (there is a better Lakota word)- from Pineridge, Rosebud and Cheynne reservations helping to connect patients to palliative care. They have arrangements for patients to meet virtually with Dr. Frannie Arneson- have not yet done this.
	<b>R21Grant-</b> Dr. Mary Isaacson et al- Through the National Institute of Nursing Research. Focus is on palliative care messaging across cultures. Ends July 31, 2024. Dr. Isaacson shared that they are looking at how no messaging, usual messaging and specially created cultural messaging impacts patient use of palliative care. This is a companion grant to the RO1 grant to help with sustainability.
	<b>SDSU RSCA Challenge Grant:</b> Brandi Pravecek- lead investigator and Mary Isaacson-co-investigator looking at the impact personal familiarity with patients has on goals of care conversations. Ended 12/31/2023. Brandi shared they are pulling all the data and will submit for publication.
	<b>SD CASIC HRSA Rural Healthcare Planning Grant:</b> Project Director- Michele Snyders with 7 Network Members to look at the feasibility of creating a statewide coalition for coordinating and advancing palliative care and hospice services in South Dakota. Getting ready to work on first deliverable- External Environmental Scan of opportunities and threats- local state and federal level.
