



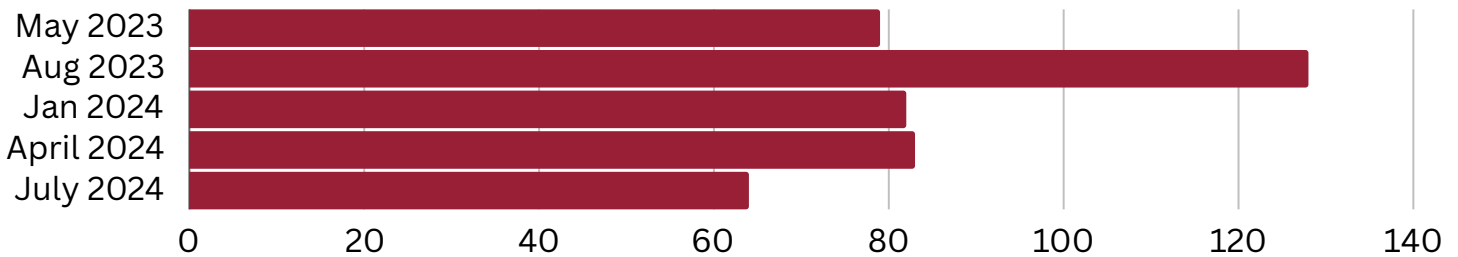
TRANSITIONS OF CARE REPORT

July 2024

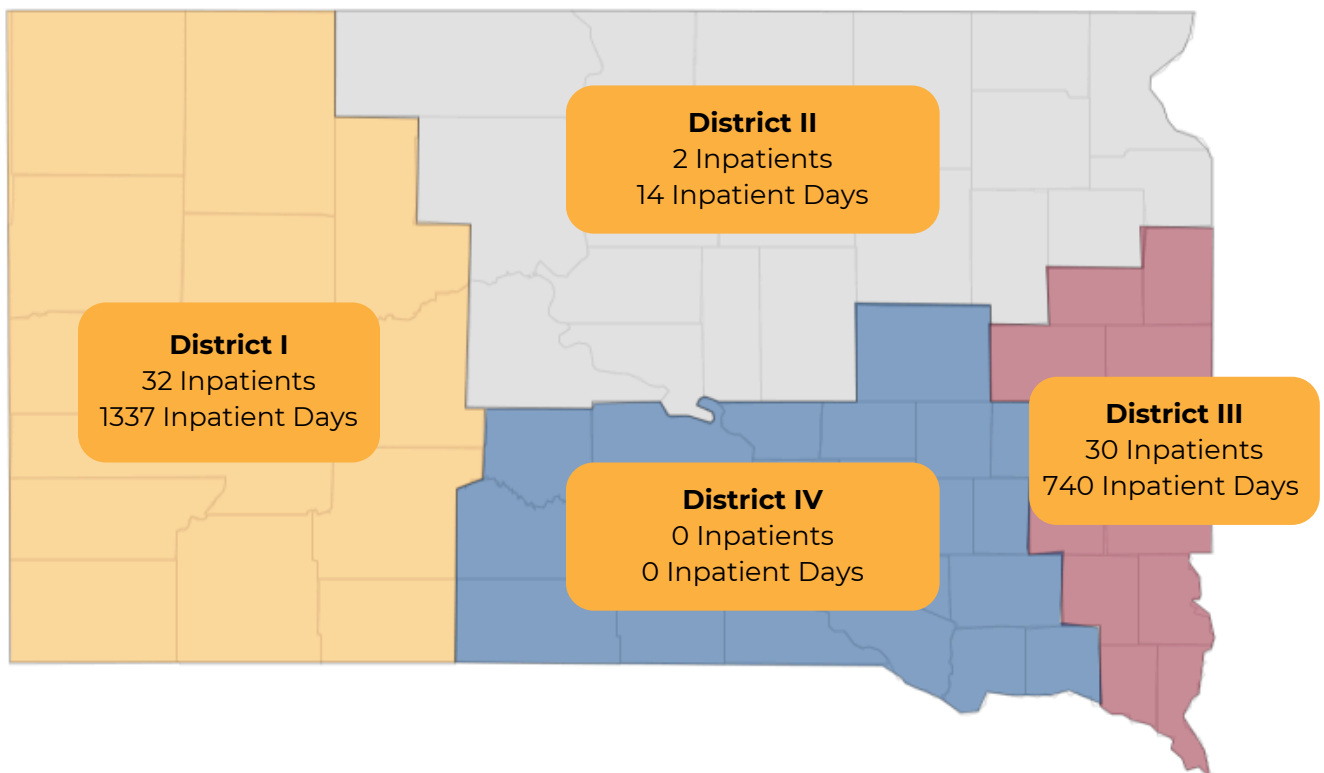
The South Dakota Association of Healthcare Organizations (SDAHO) has been hearing from members about the challenges they face in placing patients in post-acute care beds across the state. SDAHO staff have worked with peers in other states, primarily Nebraska and Minnesota, to develop a survey to collect data measuring the impact this is having across South Dakota. A total of 21 hospitals participated in the July survey, with 4 stating they had at least one patient who had been ready to discharge for seven days or longer but was still awaiting discharge. Delays in placing patients impact both the patients and the provider community, creating financial hardships and impacting quality of life. The goal of producing this survey is to help show policy makers, government leaders, and the public the impact this is having on hospitals, post-acute care providers, and patients across South Dakota. In addition to the patients awaiting discharge for 7 days or longer, at the time of the survey SD hospitals reported 13 patients in the Emergency Department awaiting an inpatient bed and 109 patients awaiting bed acceptance to a tertiary care center.

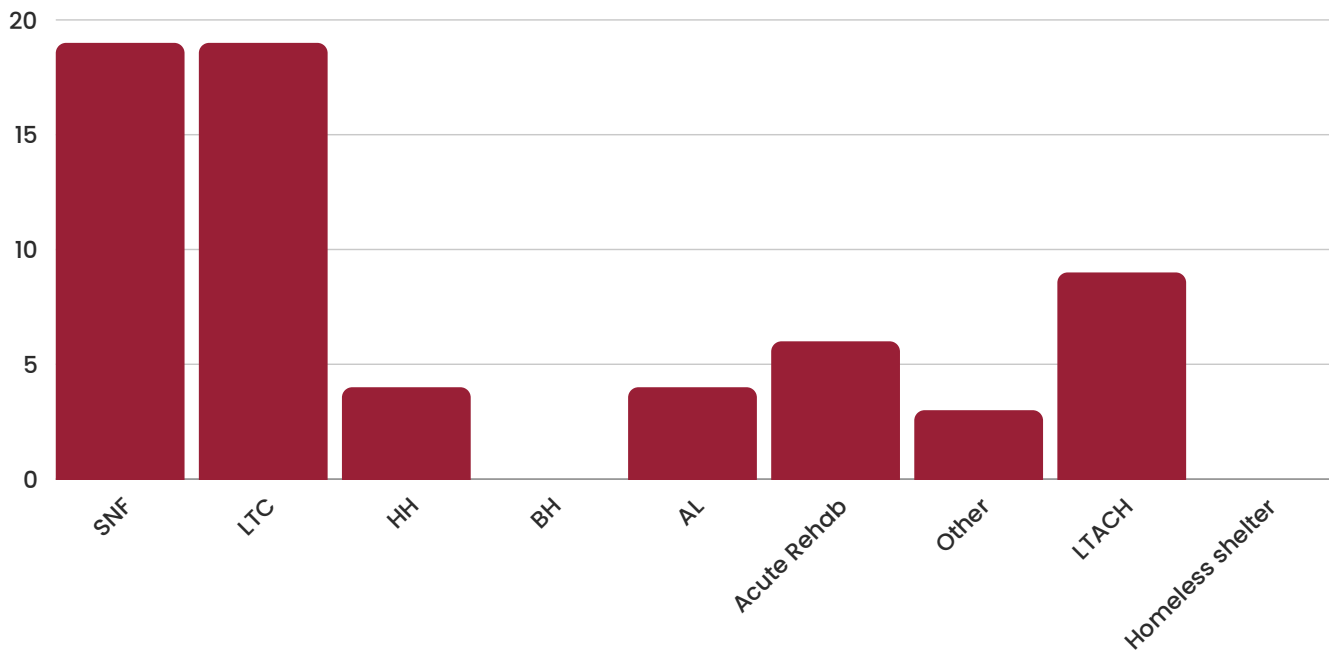
Patients Awaiting Discharge > 7 Days in SD Hospitals

Notable Comments on July 2024 Survey

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It is very hard to find a dialysis chair and nursing home bed in the same area.

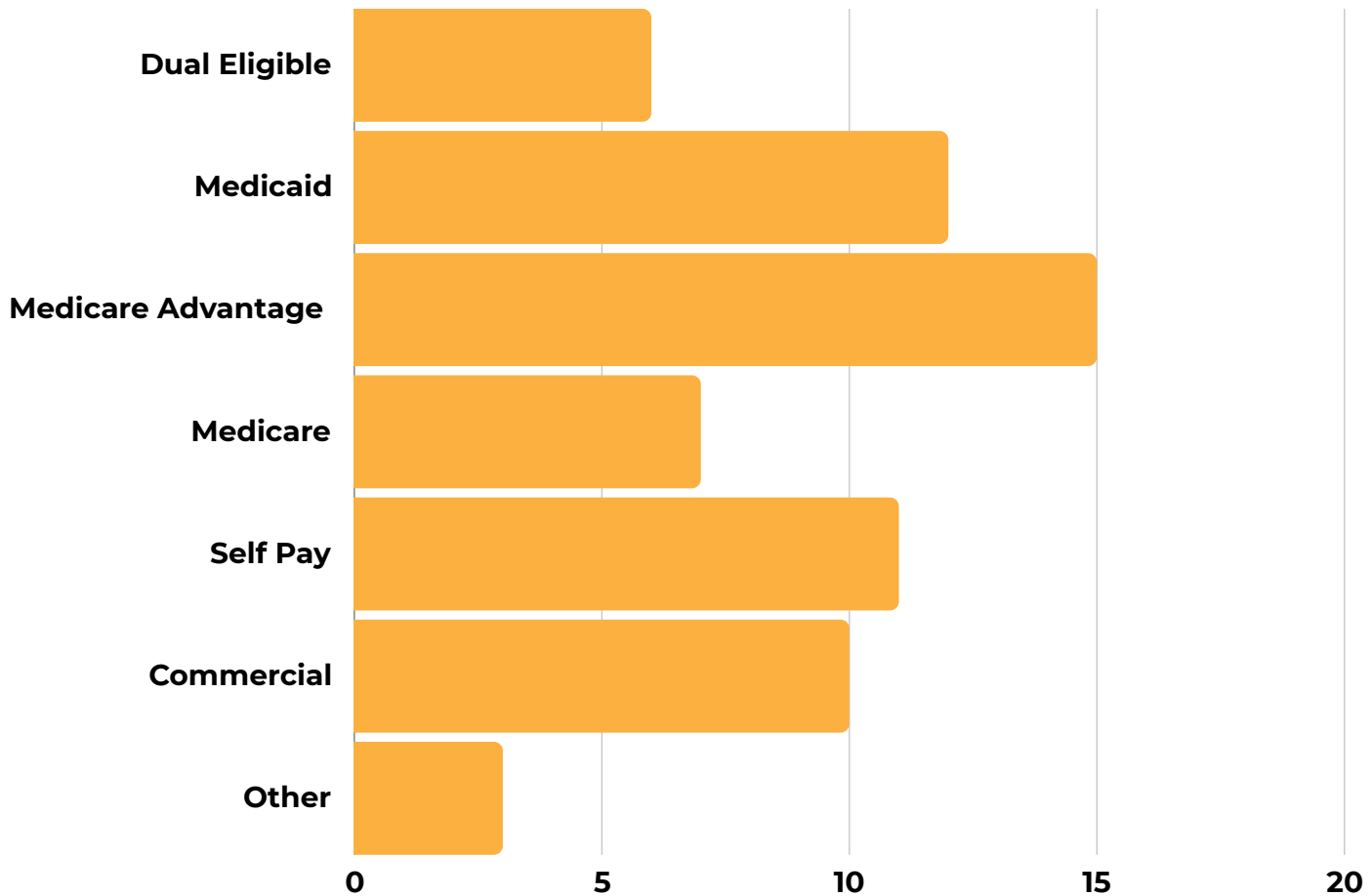
12 out of 18 of our delayed patients currently do have placement but insurance authorization is delaying discharge.

Many patients with Medicare Advantage plans that facilities do not want to accept or they do a prior auth and denied.

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Patients are having to go outside of their home community to find placement and families are upset about that.

Patients Awaiting Discharge to Post-Acute Setting > 7 by Payer Type

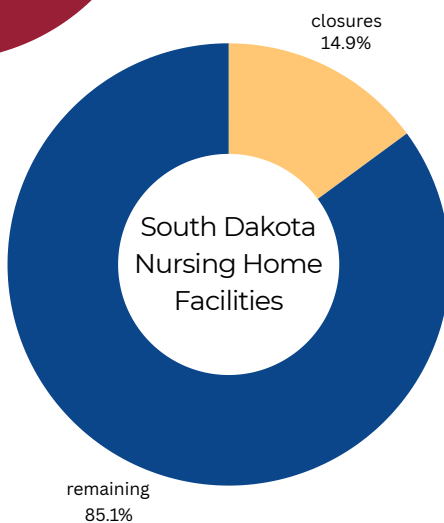
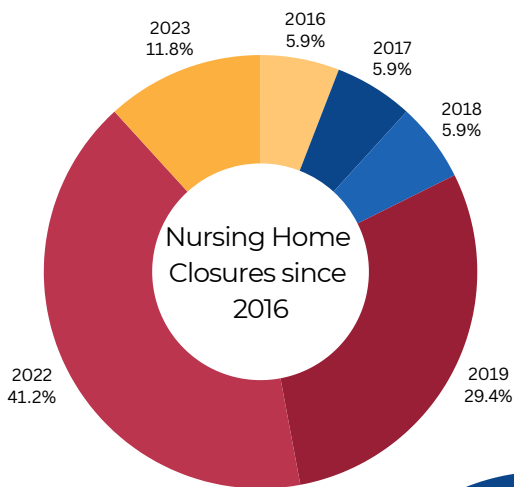
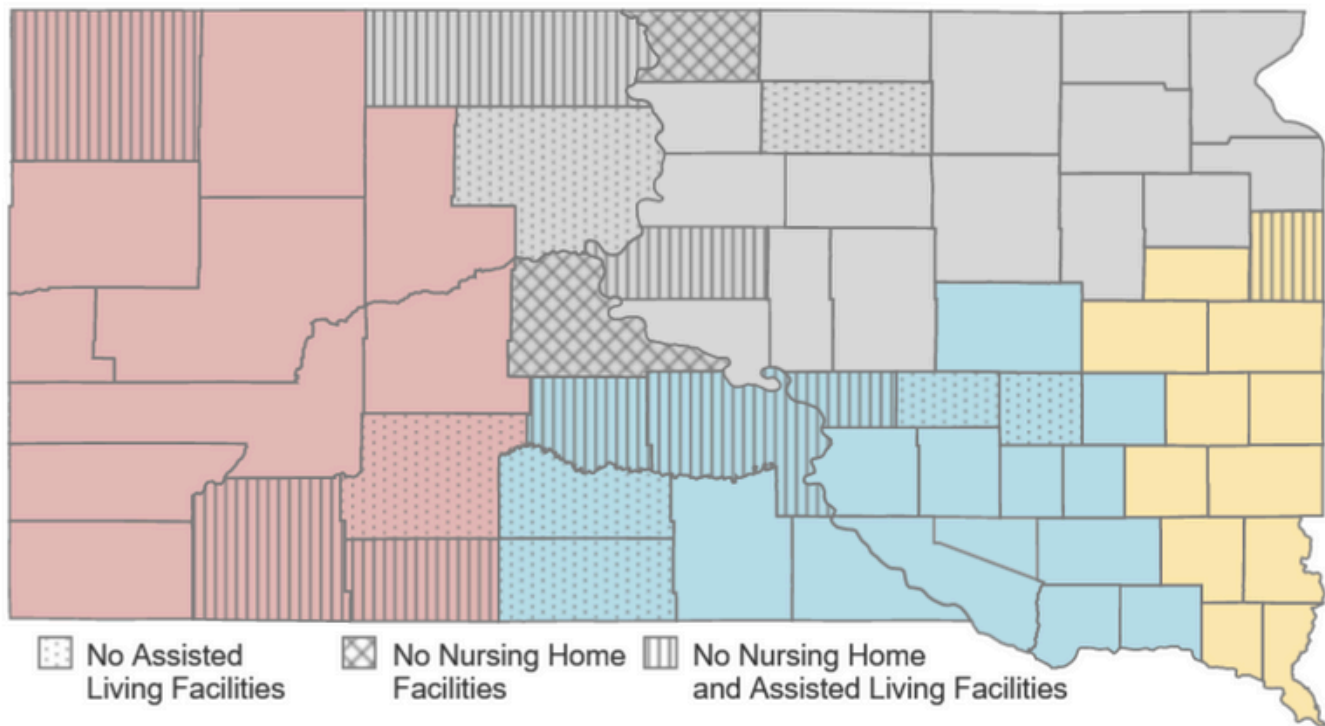


Patients Awaiting Discharge Requiring Specialized Care

- Behavioral health needs for adolescents
- Behavioral health needs for adults
- Alcohol/substance use disorder
- Bariatric needs
- Dementia care needs
- Geriatric psych
- Tracheostomy care needs
- Peg tube care needs
- Dialysis care needs
- Ventilator needs

On average it costs a hospital \$1,000 per day to care for these patients. The estimated impact at the time of the survey was \$2.09M.

South Dakota's Long-Term Care and Assisted Living Facility Status



Since 2016, 17 nursing home facilities have closed in South Dakota. These facilities provide critical services and support for South Dakota patients. Working towards providing a smooth transition across the care continuum is critical.
